VISITORS AND COMMUNITY LINKS

Ysgol Bro Famau takes pride in its efforts to play an integral part in the local community in every way it can. The whole school participates in Harvest Services and Christmas concerts which are well attended by members of the community as well as pupils, family and friends. Local clergy visit the school regularly to take whole school assemblies. The Christmas Carol Service is held at Saint Garmon and Llanferres church every other year.

Parental and community involvement in the process of education is actively encouraged. Liaison exists with other local primary schools and the High Schools to extend and enhance the curriculum with benefit to all; the pupils meet for sporting and educational events. The pupils in Years 5 and 6 benefit greatly from an established transition process.

Liaison also exists with the local police, who visit regularly. Our Police Liaison Officer PC Llinos, visits every class at least once a term to give presentations about topics such as stranger danger, drugs, internet safety, bullying and making the right choices. The junior pupils are also able to participate in the Cycling Proficiency Course.

The School Nurse visits in the summer term to talk to Year 6 children about growing up. Open the Book visit regularly to share Bible stories in a lively and imaginative way.

SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT PLAN 2018-19

A number of targets were set as part of the School Development Plan for the year 2018-19 and have been evaluated as part of the Self Evaluation process. Here is a short evaluation of the targets

Progress towards the School Improvement Plan

Priority 1: to improve pupils' writing skills in Foundation Phase and Key Stage 2 through using Pie Corbett's Talk for Writing strategies

Both FP and KS2 have implemented the Pie Corbett approach to writing. Long term plans have been written for all age groups. Book Scrutiny shows clearly that the Pie Corbett approach is having a positive impact on pupils' writing. In nearly all classrooms, working walls are being used effectively to scaffold and support the story telling and writing. Story maps are used well in each class to support a range of activities e.g. re-telling poetry, story learning walk confirmed strong progress in this area. Pupils across the school able to use working walls and model texts to highlight and discuss language features and older pupils are able to discussing the impact of these features on the audience. Good evidence across the school of these language features being developed in pupils' independent writing.

Priority 2: develop provision for maths mastery throughout the school by adopting the Inspire scheme

The school has made good progress with this priority, and there is clear evidence of the development of a mastery approach across school. Internal monitoring activities confirm developments in provision and standards - particularly in the development of a full range of data handling skills.

GwE learning walk confirmed clear evidence of mastery strategies displayed around school on Maths Working Walls, and pupils in both foundation phase and key stage 2 were confident explaining and using mastery approaches with their number work. .Development of Maths Mastery will remain an ongoing priority to ensure the continued development of provision and skills across school.

There are clear examples of maths working walls and the development of mastery strategies such as the use of concrete examples / 'Part and Whole' having a positive impact on pupils standards and attitudes to mathematics.

Priority 3: to raise standards in Foundation Phase and Key Stage 2 through effective feedback and marking

Learning walks in foundation phase and key stage 2 (April 2019) confirm the development of AFL strategies across the school, particularly the development of growth mindset and learning powers. School monitoring and GwE learning walks confirm strong and consistent progress has been made with this priority. Talking Partners, and learning zones are well developed in most classes, and there is good evidence of the development of Growth Mindset and the development of learning powers.

Learning walks confirm how well pupils have responded to these developments, particularly the opportunity to generate their own characters for learning powers. The work has linked well with the focus on developing Talk 4 Writing and maths mastery, with the development of greater pupil independence and opportunities for oracy in the classroom. This work has had a positive impact on pupils' attitudes to learning and response to feedback, and provided very good opportunities for project teachers to collaborate.

Lead staff have made strong contribution to Tier 2 meetings and work in key stage 2 has been shared as an example of very strong practice with the GwE project team

Priority 4: to achieve the Bronze award for Cymraeg Campus

Learning walk confirms staff on both sites are consistently using extended instructions with pupils in class and around the school. Nearly all pupils respond appropriately, and display positive attitudes towards learning and using Welsh. The school has made very good progress with this priority, and there is clear evidence of the regular and consistent use of Welsh by staff and pupils at both school

Criw Cymraeg have responded well to their responsibilities, and have shared a presentation with all staff and governors outlining the progress made in this area.

Priority 5: to develop pupils' ICT skills throughout the school and continue with implementation of the DCF

GwE learning walk confirms consistent use of Seesaw in nearly all classes - with pupils in year 2 independently recording and retrieving their work. There is clear evidence of DCF skills in key stage 2 particularly in the use of multimedia presentations to communicate Planning and provision for DCF has had a positive impact on IT standards across school.

GwE learning walk confirmed pupils across the school are confident in using a range of IT to support their learning across the curriculum. Older children are successfully using IT to provide feedback to peers and are able to make and explain choices about the appropriate use of IT. For example year 3/4 pupils using a range of different apps to record science investigations.

Cluster Priority: To develop pupils' independent learning skills across the cluster group through planning enterprise tasks which will provide opportunities for pupils to become ambitious and capable learners.

The school has made very good progress with this priority, and there is clear evidence that nearly all pupils are developing as increasingly independent learners as they progress through school.

The development of teaching and learning through the Shirley Clarke project, Maths Mastery and the 'Creative Planning' have further developed provision to support independent learning and opportunities to develop pupil voice.

Curriculum for Wales cluster collaboration through joint training and sharing good practice has also supported progress in this area

NEW TARGETS FOR 2019-2020

Priority 1: to raise standards in writing in KS2 and Year 2 using a range of genre to include fiction and non-fiction

Priority 4: increase the number of pupils in KS2 with a spelling age above their chronological age.

CURRICLUM ORGANISATION

Ysgol Bro Famau is a primary school for 3-11 year old pupils. The 3-7 year old pupils are in the school's Foundation Phase, which is based in Llanferres. The pupils transfer to Key Stage 2 in the Llanarmon site when they are 7 years old. Here again Years 3& 4 pupils and Years 5 & 6 pupils work very closely. This means that detailed and constant planning occurs between the staff of all the teaching years. Since September 2011, the implementation of the Foundation Phase is statutory for every child under 7 years of age in Wales. The Foundation Phase curriculum is based on Literacy, Numeracy, Knowledge and Understanding of the world, Physical development, Creative development and Personal, Social, Welfare and Diversity. Emphasis is placed on developing the pupils' skills by means of motivating experiences and activities based on various themes.

In Key Stage 2, all of the curriculum subjects – Welsh, English, Mathematics, Science, Information Technology, History, Geography, Design and Technology, Physical Education, Music and Religious Education are taught with the allocated times for each subject meeting the statutory requirements.

Since September 2013, the statutory Literacy and Numeracy Frameworks are integrated into the curricular activities.

7 and 11 year old pupils are assessed in the core subjects – Language, Literacy and Communication, Mathematical Development and Personal and Social skills for the Foundation Phase and in English, Mathematics and Science at the end of Key Stage 2. Since Summer 2013, Years 2 – 6 are assessed annually in reading and numeracy. These assessments are statutory for every school in Wales.

ADDITIONAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS AND PROVISION FOR SPECIFIC NEEDS

Every child's needs whatever they might be are catered for at this school. No discrimination is made on the basis of race, language, disability or ethnic and/or social background. Every child has the same opportunity to develop his/her full potential. The school has an accessibility plan for the disabled and both buildings are adapted for wheelchair access. A designated disabled toilet and shower room is in place within both schools.

The school operates a policy of early intervention as it is crucial that pupils who have Additional Needs are identified quickly. Outside agencies may become involved when external support is required following School Action.

Children who do not require outside agency assistance but who have additional needs, have such needs met by the school in the form of an individual plan. This is drawn up by the Additional Needs Co-ordinator and class teacher and discussed with parents and the child. Support is provided either in small groups or individually, usually within the class setting. Intervention strategies are delivered by highly skilled Teaching Assistants

There is excellent communication with Ysgol Bryn Hyfryd. The year 7 Co-ordinator visits school to discuss the needs of pupils and those with Additional Needs are highlighted for any necessary action. If a pupil is transferring to another school, the same efforts are made to ensure a smooth change over for the pupil and continuity of provision. The Additional Leaning Needs Co-ordinator attended meetings held by Denbighshire County Council to be kept up-to-date of recent changes within the Inclusion Service. The co-ordinator works alongside the class teachers and external agencies

PUPILS WITH DISABILITIES

We have an Equal Opportunities Policy and any new pupils with disabilities are treated the same as able bodied pupils. The school is fully compliant with Disabled access and use as it is a brand new building. Ysgol Bro Famau is a fully inclusive school.

Suitable provision is made for all pupils. We do not discriminate on the basis of colour, language, disability or ethnic or social background. All pupils whatever their ability, are given the same opportunity to develop their full potential. A current accessibility plan exists at school. The buildings are very accessible to wheelchairs.

THE USE OF WELSH IN SCHOOL.

Ysgol Bro Famau is an English medium primary school. However, we are aware of the fact that being in Wales that we have to comply with the Welsh Assembly's guidance that all schools throughout Wales need to provide Welsh as an additional language and that their aim is to have a bilingual Wales.

The teaching of Welsh as a second language is a statutory requirement and has dedicated time in the school's timetable. Also, extensive involvement is encouraged in activities that not only build on language skills but also develops the Welsh ethos. Children in Foundation Phase receive one hour of Welsh lessons a week and Key Stage 2 receive one and a half hours of Welsh a week. However, Welsh is used incidentally throughout the day by staff and children. All of our teachers and Classroom Assistants are proficient Welsh speakers.

The use of Welsh as an incidental (every day) language in class through various activities helps the children to become more aware and develop their understanding of the language and build confidence in their use of it. As a result, the school is developing a strong Welsh ethos that fosters pride among the staff and pupils in their locality, community, nation and culture as well as our dual languages.

The school aims to take part in a number of activities that cement this bilingual ethos and also meet the Welsh Assembly directive to create bilingual children, demonstrating confidence in both languages.

The school's engagement with the Welsh dimension was developed through St. David's Day celebrations which include a service, showcasing the children's talents in Welsh, (for example reciting and singing), and wearing of national costume. The children's Welsh knowledge was enhanced through learning the Urdd pieces and a selection of children performed in the Eisteddfod in 2017. We are very proud of our achievements this year, with several children going through to the second round of the Urdd Eisteddfod in Rhuthun and one child competing the National Eisteddfod in Bridgend in the harp and piano competition.

During the autumn term, Reception, Years 1 and 2 participated in the annual Welsh jamboree, singing Welsh action songs and being entertained by Welsh S4C presenter Martyn Geraint.

TOILET FACILITIES

The boys' and girls' toilets are of a satisfactory standard. The Llanarmon yn lal unit has benefited from refurbished toilets which are much improved. Llanferres toilets were also refurbished in the summer of 2018. All toilets are cleaned and inspected daily.

SCHOOL POLICIES

The curricular and managerial policies are adapted and reviewed as part of a rolling programme. Copies are available in school if required, please provide at least three working days' notice.

<u>SAFETY</u>

An effective safety system is in place whilst pupils and staff are in school. The safety system is reviewed regularly. A fire drill is held every term. All portable electrical appliances were inspected during the year. A full Health and Safety audit was carried out and recommendations implemented. It is ensured that the adult to pupil ratio is correct when pupils go on any excursion. The school has a number of first aiders and the correct procedures are followed whenever first aid is administered.

END OF KEY STAGE ASSESSMENT RESULTS 2019

Teacher assessment and observations are used throughout the two key stages for diagnostic purposes, to support pupils' progress, to record attainment and to report to parents. Statutory end of key stage teacher assessment is used to record pupils' attainment at the end of Foundation Phase and Key Stage 2 and information is collected centrally to monitor national performance. Assessment is an integral part of teaching and learning, helping teachers to develop an understanding of the pupils' strengths and areas for development.

Great care should be taken when analysing data in schools with very small cohorts. The performance of a small school cannot be measured by statistics alone. Members of staff are aware of the progress that the children make individually in all areas of their education and how children develop at different rates.
